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Province invests in improved postsecondary facilities

Students at Fleming College will benefit from a better learning environment thanks to McGuinty gov-

ernment investments to upgrade buildings and facilities, Jeff Leal, MPP for Peterborough, announced on February 2nd, 2007.

"Now more than ever, a good education opens the door to a prosperous career. That's why we're improving the quality of postsecondary education for students by enhancing the physical space at Fleming College," said MPP Leal.

"At the same time, we're generating economic activity in the region and creating jobs."

Fleming College is receiving \$1.15 million to fund energy efficiency projects and another \$490,180 for facilities renewal.

"Energy efficiency has to be a priority for all institutions. Fleming College is committed to sound and sustainable environmental practices

Eye on Alumni – Angela Matt

Angela is a proud graduate of Fleming College's Customs Administration program in 1993.

After graduating with honours Angela went to work for the Re-Determinations and Appeals division of the Origin Directorate, Headquarters Customs in Ottawa. In 1993, Angela joined Andersen in the tax practice with a focus on customs and indirect tax and business sectors. She has extensive experience in assisting Canadian entities, and their related foreign firms, in such areas as indirect tax impact and minimization strategies of corporate restructuring/reorganization, acquisitions and divestitures, as well as assisting with government audits and obtaining indirect tax and customs rulings.

While attending Fleming Angela was inspired by her professor Linda Skilton, who was then the coordinator of the Customs program. When speaking of Linda, Angela says "She is an extraordinary woman who has a passion for the field and I soon caught the bug myself." Linda is extremely proud of Angela who she remembers coming to Fleming as a young mother who was incredibly eager to learn. Linda admires Angela's esteemed professional success indicating she is now "holding a position that would commonly be reserved only for university graduates."

Angela feels that Fleming

College prepared her to help clients be compliant while ensuring that they do not overpay indirect taxes. She admits that it is a little unusual for a tax professional to focus on both streams, customs and indirect tax, but she really enjoys the mix of clients and projects that both bring. "I find the variety stimulating and quite energizing – it is definitely challenging but I'm never bored. In fact, I can honestly say that I love what I do."

While there is no question Angela is fulfilled professionally, she strives for the same state in her personal life. She takes on a great deal in the office and does the same at home. Angela has a daughter Hillary who is almost seventeen, as well as two terrific teenage step children Erin and Connor. She is engaged to "the most incredible man in the world" and although she says her home is often a madhouse, she wouldn't have it any other way! Most of us would long for a little peace, but this makes sense when you hear about what Angela and her family went through this past December.

Two years after receiving a tainted blood transfusion during surgery in the mid 1980's, Angela's father was diagnosed with Hepatitis C. His liver had been slowly shutting down ever since and a transplant was his only option. After realizing that a liver from a deceased donor would be almost impossible to get, her family investigated live



liver donation and decided it was the right choice for them. They discovered that Angela, her fiancé and her sister were all blood type matches. Angela was eventually chosen as the prime candidate and underwent a battery of tests to prepare for the surgery. On December 6th, Angela started her Christmas generosity early by giving the gift of life to her father. Angela had two thirds of her liver removed and transplanted into her father. After taking some time off to recuperate she is back at work as an Associate Partner in Indirect Tax at Deloitte and Touche.

Angela states very simply about her role in her father's recovery, "I consider myself very lucky to have been able to do this for my Dad – it's not every day that you get the opportunity to save someone's life."

Diversity and Global Citizenship

Educating a qualified workforce is an important goal of post-secondary education but it is also about preparing the next generation of competent citizens who will take our society forward into the future. At Fleming College, we've added a new student competency to our learning objectives, called "global citizenship". Our aim is to teach students about both their physical and their social environment, from the local to the global, and have them reflect on their role as citizens and the responsibilities they have to the world around them.

"Diversity Events" at Fleming is just one way that the College helps students develop an awareness of the issues they will confront after graduation. Whether it is learning about other cultures, the impact of global markets on developing countries or the barriers their disabled peers face every day, "Diversity Events" bring different issues to the forefront. Held on a monthly basis at Brealey campus (and soon at Frost campus as well), they

include exhibits, discussion groups, concerts, films and more.

"Diversity Events" are organized by the Diversity Office, in collaboration with student clubs and councils, staff, faculty and community partners. These partners include community groups that offer our students services, such as the New Canadians Centre, as well as business partners like Dreams of Beans, who donate fair trade coffee to our Global Café project.

The Global Café launched in February is a monthly event in the Steele Centre that offers music, free trade coffee donated by Dreams of Beans, an espresso-cappuccino machine donated by Saeco Ontario, and café-style discussion about social



justice issues. The Global Café is an open forum for students, staff, faculty and the community to discuss interesting topics with interesting people.

and we appreciate the provincial government's investment in this commitment," said Dr. Tony Tilly, President of Fleming College. "At the same time, funding for our college facilities will improve both the learning experience for students and the working environment for staff."

Close to \$200,000 of the facilities renewal funding will go toward energy improvements, such as new windows at the Frost Campus, while the balance will be invested in renovations and repairs to existing infrastructure.

Funding for energy efficiency has been applied to the first phase of the replacement of 10 Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning

(HVAC) units at the Frost and Sutherland campus locations. The replacement of these units - part of the Fleming Energy Management Action Plan established in 1999 - will contribute to a 100-tonne reduction in carbon dioxide emissions annually, and an annual cost savings of \$27,500. The contract to replace the first four units has been awarded locally to Mark V. Wilson.

The government is making a one-time \$30 million investment to support the construction of new facilities to support enrolment growth and improve energy efficiency at colleges. This funding is part of the McGuinty government's \$191 million economic stimulus package which

was developed in response to the province's current period of slower-than-anticipated economic growth.

In addition, the McGuinty government is providing \$40 million in 2006-07 through the Facilities Renewal Program to help Ontario colleges and universities refurbish classrooms and labs, improve accessibility and upgrade heating and ventilation systems.

The Facilities Renewal Program is part of ReNew Ontario, the province's five-year, strategic infrastructure investment plan. Under this plan, the government and its partners will invest more than \$30 billion in Ontario's public infrastructure by 2010.



Skilled Trades Expo:

Fleming College hosted a Career and Skilled Trades Expo for students in Grade 11 and 12 as well as member of the general public on Tuesday February 27th. The event highlighted educational and career options, and job opportunities in various industry sectors. The event included a number of hands-on activities and exhibits featuring local employers, and trades from a

variety of sectors including the manufacturing, community services and hospitality industries. The event was an outstanding success attracting over 60 exhibitors, over 1100 students and many businesses and individuals from the community. Many students brought their parents along as well to explore the Expo.

Law & Justice host Guest Speaker:

In the wake of the current media focus on the Robert Pickton trial and the vulnerability of individuals trapped inside the sex trade in Canada, the students of Fleming College's School of Law and Justice hosted an evening forum on February 7th with Natasha Falle, a former sex trade worker. The forum was open to all Fleming students and their guests at the cost of \$5 a ticket. Ms. Falle described how she first entered the sex trade when she was 14 years old. It took 12 years of violence, abuse and trauma for her to build a new life for herself. Ms. Falle is now a counselor at Streetlight, a Toronto-based non-profit agency that provides alternatives for individuals working in the sex trade in Canada. Ms. Falle spoke frankly and honestly about her experiences and thoughts concerning the sex trade in Canada. There was opportunity for discussion and questions at the end of the session as well as a reception in the Steele Centre. Students attending the forum were invited to write a one-page editorial around Ms. Falle's presentation. A bursary of \$100 will be awarded to the successful student.

Ice Sculpture wins People's Choice Award:

Fleming's Culinary program won the People's Choice Award for their ice sculpture "Under the Sea" at Lakefield Polarfest on Saturday, February 3. Fleming's team included Chefs David Hawey and Steve Bennis as well as Program Assistant Natalie Wood. The team carved an underwater scene, complete with the Fleming logo. Five Culinary students were also on-site, volunteering their time to assist all competitors. Lakefield merchants supplied each entry blocks of ice while participants supplied their own tools and materials.





New Equipment Donation:

A new piece of excavator equipment valued at \$23,000 has been donated by Hultdins Inc. to Fleming College's Centre for Heavy Equipment Technology. The Rototilt RT30 model has already been installed on one of the excavators used in the college's heavy equipment programs. Students in both the Heavy Equipment Operator and Motive Power Techniques programs are now using the Rototilt in their studies.

"Our primary interest in donating the Rototilt to the Heavy Equipment programs at Fleming College is to provide exposure to the students to this new product technology. We understand that many of the students will be employed with Heavy Equipment dealers who represent our products," says Gerry Mallory, President and General Manager of Hultdins Inc.

Arboriculture Program wins Award of Merit:

Fleming College's Arboriculture program has been recognized with an Award of Merit from the International Society of Arboriculture (Ontario Chapter).

Fleming was given the award for: "Advancing the principles, ideals and practice of Arboriculture in Ontario," at the ISA Ontario Chapter's annual conference held February 14 to 16. Joe Outram, Arboriculture Program Coordinator, accepted the award on behalf of the college. "Having Fleming's programs immersed in individual industries is absolutely essential. It helps drive recruitment, job placement, and recognition in general. It's a win-win situation," he says. "Arboriculture organizations see the value in what we do here, and how we are contributing."

The Arboriculture program at Fleming has had a 100 per cent job placement rate since 1998. Mr. Outram says there is a shortage of workers in the industry with students receiving up to a half-dozen job offers upon graduating.

Outstanding Alumni:

Glenn Duncan, A GIS – Cartographic Specialist alumnus working in the United States has received the civilian Employee of the Year Medal from the District of Columbia Metropolitan Police Department in Washington D.C.

Mr. Duncan is a Crime Analyst in the police department's Third District. He was awarded the medal for his work on detecting and analyzing crime trends - in particular, robbery patterns - which contributed to several arrests.

Ciao Fleming:

The eighth annual Ciao Fleming Luncheon took place on Monday, February 12th. The event organized by Dr. Joe Mior and Chartwell's raises money for the student food bank through the sale of special spaghetti dinners featuring Dr. Mior's homemade sauce. The meal included spaghetti, bruschetta and a beverage. \$1 from each meal went to support the student food bank.





Outreach

The Cobourg campus recently hosted area secondary school Guidance Counsellors, Co-op, Law and Fashion/Cosmetology teachers for a tour of the new facilities and to hear firsthand from program coordinators about the full time programs – Police Foundations, Esthetician and Personal Support Worker - offered in Cobourg. The presentation also included a short overview of the services provided by Job Connect and Academic Upgrading. Guests were able to clarify student questions about the programs and career options with the coordinators and faculty of these programs.

FACULTY FOCUS

Carmen Moore, Heavy Equipment – Frost Campus

The first thing that strikes you after a conversation with Carmen is how dedicated he is to the students in the Centre for Heavy Equipment Technology at Fleming College. The second is just how humble this accomplished man is.

Carmen joined the Heavy Equipment team as a professor in 1996. He was well qualified. After completing his apprenticeship in both Truck Coach and Automotive Service Technician he began working as a service technician and shop foreman in a General Motors dealership primarily in Electrical and Electronics. After ten years he moved on to his true passion – teaching. He began working as an instructor at Centennial College in the General Motors Automotive Service Education Program, a unique course introduced in 1987 that trained apprentices specifically for GM dealers. Carmen was one of four instructors in the program and taught for ten years.

After two years teaching in the Centre for Heavy Equipment Technology, Carmen became the Coordinator and has been quite successfully for the past eight years. When asked what he likes most about teaching at Fleming College, Carmen's response is quick, "I love introducing the students to the industry and to opportunities that they might not have known are out there. Most don't realize how big the industry is and what an impact it has on everything in our lives."

One of the best experiences that



Carmen has had at Fleming was in 2000, when as coordinator, Carmen presented a 5 year proposal to the Economic Development Group of Ontario in request of Strategic Skills Investment Grant funding. The centre was suffering from a

severe lack of space and up to date technology. The proposal was approved and the centre was awarded \$2.8M in funding! This allowed for updated equipment for student learning, much needed facility expansion and a huge step forward for the program and the students. The Centre became a four-way partnership between the College, the Ministry, industry and most importantly the students. But Carmen is quick to give the credit to his Fleming colleagues. "This was a success because of the entire faculty; no one wins the game on

their own. It is only through the support of the team that we were successful. That is what has allowed us to become the premier facility for this type of training."

And the centre continues to grow rapidly...the Electrical Power Generation Technician program launched in January of 2007 with 60 students and a one semester specialty training program, Power Lift, will be launched in January 2008. This makes Carmen, a technician at heart, very proud, but his true pride comes in knowing that his students are well prepared.

"I want to continue to stay current with the industry and to have a positive impact on our students. Our sole reason for being here as faculty is to help students to help themselves; it is a great feeling to open the door at the beginning for those who know very little about the industry and to know that when they graduate they are running out that door ready to go and well prepared."



Fleming wins OCAA Curling Gold and Silver

The Fleming College Knights captured gold and silver medals at the OCAA curling championships hosted by Mohawk College the first weekend in March. The varsity women's team went undefeated to win Fleming's first ever



gold medal in curling. Skip Marteen Lortie, vice Heather Kreuts, second Robyn Finner and lead Katherine Bennet beat Algoma College twice, including 7-3 in the gold medal game, called in the 10th end when Algoma conceded. Fleming's Isac Meadows, Allison Rodgers, Tim Gilroy, Vanessa Korpi, and Aislyn Don lost to Algonquin College

(Ottawa) 10-3 in the final to win silver in the mixed final. Fleming conceded in the eighth end. The Knights were coached by Steve Whitehill and Dave Farnell. It was also the best combined showing in Fleming history. The Knight women opened with a 10-5 win over Algoma then defeated Algonquin 11-7 and Mohawk 8-1 to finish first in round-robin action and receive a bye to the final. Fleming snapped a 2-2 tie with a deuce in the fourth end and single point steals in five, six and seven to lead 7-2.

OBITUARY

On November 3, 2006, the flag at Fleming College was lowered at half mast to honour a great friend of Fleming College- Eileen "Stevie" McGregor- who passed away after a lengthy illness.

Stevie was heavily involved in community and charitable activities, among them serving as the first female chair of the Peterborough Red Cross and Community Chest, Peterborough's first female police commissioner and was also appointed by then Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau to a federal task force on multiculturalism, to study issues arising from immigration.

In 1971, Stevie joined Fleming College. Her involvement with her beloved Fleming, in many different capacities, continued until her death. She was committed to education and the freedom of women. In 1978, Stevie was appointed as the first women's advisor to the President of Fleming College, and she continued her advocacy for female students. In

1985, Stevie received the Fleming Board of Governors Citizenship Award.

Following her retirement, Stevie served on the Board of Governors of Fleming for several years.

In 1999, Stevie was awarded the Order of Ontario—the highest honour given by the province—in recognition of her years of contribution to her community. That same year, Stevie established the Eileen McGregor Student Bursary to assist single mothers "with courage and determination" to return to college to further their education. Over the years, many recipients of her bursary had tea with her in her home. She enjoyed being involved in assisting them with their education. These bursaries will continue on as her legacy. Fleming College and its students meant the world to her and she worked tirelessly at promoting it and them.

At the Fleming College Awards Ceremony last November, Former College President, Brian Desbiens



spoke fondly about Stevie, "She was a wife, mother, student, teacher, board member, mentor, community developer, political advisor, feminist and student advisor. Fleming College was blessed to have her as one of its first faculty. She believed in the potential of her students, fellow faculty and the community college. She made a difference for so many." Fleming College will miss her.



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
