

WELCOME TO THE HALIBURTON SCHOOL OF ART + DESIGN

We're looking forward to having you with us in the inspirational Haliburton Highlands. The following details will assist you with your preparations.

Locations:

All courses, unless otherwise specified, are held at the Haliburton Fleming College campus, located at 297 College Drive. Please refer to our online map of Haliburton village to assist you with travel.

Hours:

Your classes will run from 9:00am to 4:30pm, Monday to Friday, unless otherwise specified, with an hour midday lunch break.

Food and Beverages:

There is a small servery on campus open Monday to Friday, 8:30am to approximately 1:30pm. Additionally, there is a microwave and refrigerator available for your use.

Accommodation:

Browse options at Places4Students – search "Fleming College – Haliburton" and then click Property Listings. Additional accommodation information is available through the Haliburton Highlands Tourism department which can also be reached at 1-800-461-7677. We recommend that you inquire about cancellation policies. In our experience, the hosts are very co-operative but it's best to clarify to avoid a situation where you lose your accommodation fees if we or you need to cancel your course (which we will notify you of 2 weeks prior).

Materials you need to bring:

Where applicable, a list of materials necessary for your course is included in this document. Minimal materials are available for purchase on site (unlike previous years, we may NOT have an art supplier on site) – we suggest you bring everything with you. Please feel free to check the status of your course if you are concerned about investing in materials. There are some limited arts supplies available at local retail outlets.

Course Cancellations:

All courses are subject to cancellation in the event of insufficient registration or public health directives. Should your course be cancelled due to insufficient registration, you will be notified 2 weeks in advance of course start by email and/or phone on file. Ensure that we have an alternate means of reaching you if you will not be at home. Assume that your course is running as scheduled unless you hear otherwise. You are eligible for a full refund of fees or the option of transferring to another course within the current HSAD schedule (pending space availability) if the college cancels a course.

Refund Policy:

- <u>If You Cancel</u>: All notifications of cancellation must be received in writing. If you cancel any time up to 14 days prior to course start, you will receive a full refund, less a \$25 administrative fee. If you cancel later than 14 days prior to course start, fees will not be refunded. This policy applies in all circumstances due to our commitment to students and instructors two weeks prior to course start. Should you be able to attend a different course within the current schedule/year we would be happy to attempt to accommodate you, pending space availability.
- Courses are non-transferable.

<u>Mandatory Studio Safety Practices apply – See below</u> <u>NO OPEN-TOE OR HEEL SHOES IN THE STUDIO</u>

Please bring:

This will be a highly experiential class and you will work (and play) hard all week. To get the most out of your class time, you are encouraged to spend a little time getting prepared. Most of the suggested supplies are basic and readily available. The following is a guide to assist you in gathering the required materials.

Acrylic Paint: (heavy body or fluid or a combination)

- Red, yellow & blue One of each is sufficient, but feel free to bring more if you have them.
- White: Titanium white + 1 or 2 others such as titan buff, zinc white, or similar. You will use more white paint than you expect.
- Black: Any version of black.
- Earth tones: raw or burnt sienna, raw or burnt umber, naples yellow, yellow ochre, or similar. No need to bring all of them but having a few to play with will greatly enhance your colour mixing and value options.
- Acrylic fluid medium(s): such as matte medium or glazing liquid. (Gel or other heavy or specialized mediums are not required but feel free to bring them if you want to play with them.)

Supports:

- 4 6 firm supports such as stretched canvases, canvas boards, watercolour paper, or similar. Size is your choice, small or large. Suggestion: try using a size or shape that is new to you. Be prepared to work on multiple projects at the same time. If you choose to work on paper, bring a board to support it on the easel.
- A few sheets of heavy paper, a canvas pad, (or perhaps some re-purposed cardboard boxes?) or similar surfaces for playing with ideas.

Tools:

- A large paint brush (at least 2"). A "Hardware store" type of brush is fine.
- a few smaller brushes,
- a palette knife(s).
- Pencils, pens, markers, or other mark-making tools.
- Scrapers, rags, sponges and other application tools (optional but fun to play with).

Equipment:

- Easel: if you have a floor easel that you can bring, please do so. Some are available at the college, but your own is probably sturdier. You will work at the easel most of the time.
- Palette: a surface on which to mix your paints. Any palette will suffice, but a "wet palette" is recommended. You can easily make your own wet palette by following the instructions on the instructor's website. Click on this link: https://www.grethejensen.com/learning-resources/create-your-own-wet-palette/

Extras:

- Apron, gloves, water container.
- Paper towels and/or rags.
- Your device phone, tablet, or laptop.
- You will be encouraged to select your own subject matter, so bring your ideas, favourite art books, photographs or other materials for inspiration.

MANDATORY STUDIO SAFETY PRACTICES

Your health and safety is our priority. Our studio environments can have a number of objects, tools and chemicals that require personal protective equipment (PPE) or other consideration for your wellbeing. All persons (including faculty, staff and students) are asked to observe the following while in the shops and studios:

- Wear sturdy and appropriate shoes such as sneakers, closed leather shoes or work boots *open-toed shoes, flip-flops or high heels are not allowed*
- No long, dangling clothing or accessories (scarves, flowing sleeves, chains, long necklaces, etc.)
- Long hair must be tied back
- No bare skin if exposure to chemical or tools/machinery is likely
- Appropriate PPE is mandatory when operating tools and equipment within the studios. Please consult with the faculty or studio technician to determine the appropriate PPE required for specific machines and studio processes.

Fit tests are required for courses requiring a respirator as noted on your material list. Arrangements will be made on site.

As these are mandatory safety practices, we will follow up directly with students who may have oversighted the above. Individuals may be asked to address any concerns before continuing to work in the studio.

Be sure to buy appropriate, good quality safety articles and equipment i.e. safety boots, protective eyewear, hearing protection, work gloves, x-acto knives, etc. – ask your supplier for advice.
