

Through Visual Communication

he Alaska Highway stretches through remote northern bogs, mountains, forests, and rivers.

From mile zero at Dawson Creek, B.C. through the Yukon and deep into central Alaska, it is an impressive roadway. Built at great expense and hardship during World War II, today it remains a critical connector for people living and working in the north.

As an avian wildlife ecologist in the Yukon Territory, from a riverbank's old growth spruce forest, I looked down on the highway as one of its bridges underwent repair. It was springtime and a colony of cliff swallows had recently returned from their wintering grounds, a continent away in the Amazon Basin. This incredible migration to Canada's far north is driven by the single goal of raising young, and is fueled by an abundance of natural resources. For a cliff swallow, northern resource extraction equates to the harvesting of flying insects. But for these birds the journey was made in vain. I looked on as the construction crew scraped several dozen of their delicate nests off of the bridge and into the cool river below. It is possible that the birds were able to nest again, but in the short northern summer it is more likely that they would return to South America unsuccessful.

The experience represented a critical turning point in my career. We need to communicate better and understand

our interactions with nature. To enable the metaphor of the highway, we need

connectors. We need scientists to help us understand change in our environment, politicians to write laws, lawyers to help enforce them, and perhaps most of all, we need engaged and educated citizens

to direct our society. Without effective communication the system falls apart.

I am proud of the work I have done as a conservation biologist, but I realized that I might better contribute to our society through creative, thoughtful and relevant communication. If I could tell the swallow story in the right way, would people listen? Fortunately, I'm not alone in asking if there is a better way to fix a bridge.

The following spring I enrolled in a Fleming College certificate program

offered at the Royal Ontario Museum. I was joining the first cohort of a new and intensive program that enables a more

effective generation of environmental communication by blending art, science and strategic storytelling. The Environmental Visual Communication (EVC) program offers instruction in a variety of technical skills such as social media strategy, design, and video editing, but its centerpiece is the summer placement program. Here is where the connectivity of the program comes into light. Students fan out across Ontario, Canada and around the globe working with organizations on existing projects or creating their own. Collaboration is key.

Since graduating from the EVC program, I have been actively working on projects within the broad field of environmental communication, using my new insights to advance environmental conservation discourse. One of these projects is telling stories of cliff swallows, and other songbird populations under stress. Ultimately, a documentary film will be seen by millions of people who will be able to join the discussion on how we want to repair our bridges, and in ways that even cliff swallows can appreciate. *

urray Hall is a man with great charisma and ambition who explores new ways to provide leading edge technology to aquatic and environmental fields. His career path is remarkable.

Soon after completing his studies at Fleming College's Frost Campus in Lindsay, Murray became the youngest person to achieve the designation of Ministry of Natural Resources Park Warden. He then moved on to become a Wildlife Technician during which time

he built strong relationships with industry partners in Dalian Province, China.

Through this point in his career, Murray taught fur grading to new Chinese ranchers and undertook a significant task—one not ever attempted by anyone—to transport five shipments of live mink breeding stock to China (200,000 animals in total). He reduced mortality from 10% on the first shipment to 0% on the final two shipments.


In 1991, Murray founded Halltech Environmental Inc.—a research and precisions systems business. With over 20 years of partnering with clients to enable the rapid and efficient collection of data in the field, Halltech has become a trusted supplier of the most diverse product lines in the archeology, forestry, geology, limnology and pedology industries. His customers include government, educational and private facilities; multinational forestry and mineral exploration companies; as well as environmental and agricultural consulting firms.

As a result of his career success and personal drive to modernize technology, Murray expanded his business by establishing Halltech Aquatic Research. This division of Halltech services and builds fisheries related equipment such as the Electric Fishing Boat, the HT2000 Electro Anesthesia System and the HT-2000 Battery Backpack Electrofisher. His products are vital to aquatic scientists and field experts around the world.

With ambitions such as his, it is no wonder that Murray is recognized as a Canadian innovator. Murray designed and produced countless custom fresh water sampling apparatus, he integrated GPS receivers with rugged computers for georeferencing large data sets in remote locations and he developed the first Canadian-made Backpack Electrofishing System. Murray is a pioneer in precision in the agricultural sector with the first highprecision autopilot system on a tractor using GPS. This technology is now utilized throughout the agricultural sector to give farmers the ability to greatly reduce the amount of fertilizers and herbicides they are using to improve surface and groundwater quality.

Murray demonstrates that "anything is possible." He implements this approach into his business, his relationships with his clients throughout the industry, his community partners at Fleming College and through his many volunteer leadership roles.

Murray is the well-respected Chair of Fleming College's Fish and Wildlife Advisory Committee, where he has been a member since 2001. He is also a member of the Guelph Waste Management Coalition, Leech Lake Stewardship Committee, the Friends of Mill Creek, the American Fisheries Society and the Prospector and Developers Association.



With regards to his education at Fleming College, Murray says that Fleming set the framework for his success. The technical training he received in both the fisheries and wildlife management courses were perfectly suited to his work as a field technician. Becoming accustomed to heavy workloads and strict deadlines was the ideal preparation for his ultimate career as an entrepreneur and innovator.

More importantly, the strong sense of community and family amongst fellow students and faculty laid a solid foundation for his future as a mentor and a proud husband, father and grandfather ... in his opinion, the greatest achievement of all.

Murray is the recipient of several awards including the Ontario Global Trader Award for Innovation and the Ontario Global Trader Award for Market Expansion. Last year, Murray was honoured with a Fleming College Premier's Awards – Technology nomination for outstanding contribution that a college graduate makes to Ontario and throughout the world.

Linking Leisure to Patient Therapy



n a world where people with physical, cognitive or social limitations are learning the skills to face their challenges with ease, you will find Mark Parolin heightening the awareness of linking leisure activities to patient treatment—treatment that is unique for each individual needing care.

In 2013, Mark was intrigued by a career opportunity to develop a new post-graduate program in Therapeutic Recreation (TR) to compliment other programs within the School of Community Development and Health at Fleming College—even if it meant travelling from his home in Woodstock, Ontario to fulfill his commitment. He proudly accepted the position as Program Coordinator and began to create a high quality program curriculum in time for a fall intake of over 20 students. Students enrolled in the three-semester program are university or college graduates from kinesiology, psychology, social work, recreation or other health related fields.



Mark teaches future therapeutic recreation professionals to use a variety of techniques using a patient's personal leisure activities that will help them enjoy greater independence, improve health and well-being and reduce the effects of their illness or disability. He loves the opportunity to use his full gamut of experience to influence what is being taught in the profession.

"We train students to become professionals who reintroduce an individual's interest as part of their treatment," says Mark. "This helps to achieve better health and improve the quality of one's life."

Mark is a strong advocate for strengthening the Therapeutic Recreation post-graduate program at Fleming College and for drawing attention to the health benefits of recreational therapy in communities everywhere. He believes it is a profession with great potential, yet many people don't know the value of using leisure activity to achieve treatment goals. As more people become aware of this type of professional treatment, there is an increasing need for skilled graduates to work as private practitioners providing services in hospitals, treatment facilities and the community.

Mark lived with his family in Saskatoon for ten years and taught TR full time for the Saskatchewan Institute of Applied Science and Technology. While living in Saskatchewan, Mark earned his Masters Degree in Education in Curriculum Studies at the University of Saskatchewan. He also served as

a board member and education liaison chair for the Canadian Therapeutic Recreation Association (CTRA) and has been a registered member of Therapeutic Recreation Ontario (TRO) for many years. After moving back to Ontario to be closer to family, Mark taught related courses through Georgian College, Seneca College, Niagara College and Ontario Learn before his teaching venture at Fleming.

Outside of teaching, Mark tries to role model the importance of leisure in his own life. He enjoys the benefits and well-being that comes from playing basketball and soccer and biking with his wife and two children.

Mark's desire to share his experience and vast knowledge of the field with others is admirable. He will be proud to recognize the first Therapeutic Recreation graduating class later this year once the student field work is complete. •



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KAWARTHA TRADES AND TECHNOLOGY CENTRE

A Shift to Student Financial Assistance

t's a building shaping up to inspire bright futures in trades and technology. The transformation of the Kawartha Trades and Technology Centre (KTTC) at Fleming College since the ground-breaking ceremony in July 2012 is very impressive. Equally impressive are the partnerships that have formed as a result of the \$1M "Building Skills. Shaping Futures." capital campaign for equipment and infrastructure.

A surprise announcement by the College made in February revealed that the KTTC fundraising campaign had reached \$1.35M. With the campaign deemed a huge success and some groups expressing interest in supporting student financial assistance, the focus has now shifted to a \$250,000 campaign effort to support students in the School of Trades and Technology.

"Our campaign cabinet has extended their efforts and set a new goal to raise \$250,000 for student bursaries and awards," says KTTC campaign Co-Chair Jay Amer. "The idea was derived from community supporters looking for a way to help the students make ends meet while pursuing their career."

Last year, Fleming received nearly 3,000 applications for student financial assistance and only 430 donor sponsored awards and bursaries were available. With a 20% increase in applications for

trades and technology programs this fall, the number of financial aid applications will increase.

The local media have been outstanding supporters of the KTTC fundraising campaign. Through their generous donation of radio, television and print ads, the media partners continue to drive awareness in the community of the new facility, its trades and technology programs and the fundraising campaign to encourage community members to make a gift.

Fleming College graduates Jim Horkey (Construction Skills '13), Tim Duvall (Computer Engineering Technoloist '03) and Scott Fleming (Carpentry Apprentice - Advanced '01) can be heard sharing their personal stories throughout the various media channels.

Inside the 87,000 square-foot facility, construction crews and Fleming College staff are eagerly working to have the new state-of-the-art facility ready for its first intake of students in in the fall of 2014. The KTTC will feature

enjoy excellent benefits. The School of Trades and Technology at Fleming College provides hands-on training incorporating the latest techniques in a wide variety of apprenticeship, skilled trades and technology programs. espite a growing demand for skilled trades and technology workers in Ontario, there are few women who choose to enter this typically maledominated sector. Fleming College is trying to change that. Fleming is fostering opportunities that encourage women to consider training for a job that will prepare them for a well-paid career.

According to a recent Statistics Canada study, women make up only 5% of the workers in trades and manufacturing in Canada and less than 3% get involved in apprenticeship training.

Women in Trades & Technology

The reality is that skilled trades and technology workers require a strong academic foundation in reading, writing, math and sciences along with dexterity, stamina, good hand-eye coordination and balance—all qualities that both men and women possess equally.

A woman working in the skilled trades industry is not new. During World War II, women stepped in to perform jobs vacated by men who were fighting overseas. They built machinery, welded aircraft, operated heavy equipment and so much more.

Today, the stereotypes of skilled trades are being challenged and are changing. Fleming College is a strategic leader in this change and they strongly support the women who take interest in enrolling in their trades and technology programs.

Fleming College student Emma
Bauman is in her second semester of
the Carpentry Practices program and
plans to expand her skills by taking
Fleming's Heating, Refrigeration and Air
Conditioning Technician program in
the fall.

"Fleming College offers excellent trades and technology programs," says Emma. "I love the hands-on learning approach that the College offers and the faculty I learn from every day are very supportive."

Fleming College will continue to work on developing recruitment strategies that will encourage women to consider a career in trades and technology.

Fleming's Project Management Students Work for Community Sustainability

This past year, Fleming's Project Management students took on a large multi-faceted project to support sustainability in our local community. Five project teams worked with the City of Peterborough and Fleming College (co-owners of the Peterborough Sport and Wellness Centre) to gather operational data and information to support the application of Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, Existing Buildings Operations and Maintenance (LEED EBOM) certification. The intent is to achieve a LEED Gold level certification for the Peterborough Sport and Wellness Centre. LEED is an international building certification standard that supports benchmarking and tracking results in terms of energy savings, sustainable building practices and overall benefits to occupants.

The students were divided into groups to lead five subprojects, namely: Waste Audit; Community Transportation Survey; Occupant Comfort Survey; Cleanliness and Maintenance Audit; and LEED Performance Period Management. Each project entailed data gathering from both the building operation and the community to identify ways to make the facility more sustainable and energy efficient. The students were able to apply theoretical project management concepts to a "real world" project in tandem with classroom learning. This part of the learning process is cited as one of the most beneficial learning activities of the Project Management program.

The students formally presented the Community
Sustainability project to the City of Peterborough and Fleming
College and the application for LEED certification has been
submitted. The project work was so impressive that it has paved
the way for future opportunities to work on more projects for
Sustainable Peterborough.

This particular Project Management project provided a chance for students to learn in the real world while supporting our local community. •

With their assigned chef, students planned their menu using mandatory ingredients and began cooking. Each team prepared an appetizer using duck, a main course using chicken and mushrooms and a dessert using goat cheese and prosecco.

By 6:30 p.m., approximately 80 guests were seated in Fulford's Restaurant and presented with a sample plate from each team's three course menu. Each guest voted for their favourites. After tallying the votes, Team 1 won for Best Appetizer (Open faced duck tacos with beans, tomato salsa, micro greens & cilantro with citrus vinaigrette); Team 2 won for Best Main Course (Chicken "Kalbi" mushroom ragout and rice vermicelli); and Team 3 won for Best Dessert (Crispy goat cheese dumpling with a sparkling wine and raspberry coulis).


