

### FLEMING COLLEGE SIGNS INDIGENOUS EDUCATION PROTOCOL

t a signing ceremony on December 7, the College's Board of Governors and Aboriginal Education
Council endorsed Colleges and Institutes
Canada's Indigenous Education Protocol.
Signing this Protocol is a significant step forward for Fleming and will reaffirm the importance of Indigenous education at the College.

The Indigenous Education Protocol is made up of seven principles:

- Commit to making Indigenous education a priority.
- Ensure governance structures recognize and respect Indigenous peoples.
- Implement intellectual and cultural traditions of Indigenous peoples through curriculum and learning approaches relevant to learners and communities.

- Support students and employees to increase understanding and reciprocity among Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples.
- Commit to increasing the number of Indigenous employees with ongoing appointments throughout the institution, including Indigenous senior administrators.
- Establish Indigenous-centred holistic services and learning environments for learner success.
- Build relationships and be accountable to Indigenous communities in support of self-determination through education, training and applied research.



The signing respects and recognizes that Indigenous people—First Nation, Métis and Inuit—have distinct cultures, languages, histories, and contemporary perspectives. Fleming College has a long history of supporting their Aboriginal learners and recognizes that Indigenous education emanates from the intellectual and cultural traditions of Indigenous peoples in Canada.

ental wellness refers to our emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It affects how we think and feel and impacts how we handle stress, relate to others and make choices. I have worked with clients experiencing mental health issues for over ten years to support them in overcoming the many barriers that they face on a daily basis and I believe that recovery is possible for anyone. I truly value being able to support people throughout their journey and I believe that we can provide a stronger community of care for those facing mental health issues by openly listening to their wants and needs.

I had a real "aha moment" that really changed my approach to working with clients at a workshop about six years ago. The workshop was geared towards educating participants, who included mental health consumers and professionals, about the "Hearing Voices Movement." This movement promotes hearing voices as a normal variation in the

human experience. It explains that the problem is not hearing voices itself, but the inability to cope with the experiences, and focuses on non-medical solutions that improve life of people who are distressed by hearing voices. The intent of the workshop was to form a network that could provide a safe environment where people who hear, see or sense things that others do not, can feel accepted, valued and understood.

It was the workshop speaker, a self identified voice hearer, who had helped me to realize that my own disquiet about voice hearing had prevented me from truly understanding the experience. His message was that having his voices acknowledged as a tangible experience had changed his life, and that I could help others change theirs too, just by listening. I learned to stop being afraid to ask the wrong questions and let my own natural curiosity take over when asking my client's about their voices; "What do they sound like, and what kind of things do they say?"

and most importantly, "What do they mean to you?" Whole new worlds of conversations and ways to get to know my clients emerged and in turn they had a safe space to talk freely about their experiences with voice hearing.

I don't think this approach is revolutionary. After all, we are all just humans having human experiences, so why not ask about these experiences? I encourage you as professionals, and fellow humans to approach everyone with a genuine curiosity about their experiences (no matter what they are) and let them lead the way. Just watch how things change—your compassion and understanding could mean the world to someone.







Readers asked us for their secipe and the chefs have shared it!

### MAPLE APPLE TARTE TANTIN

Ingredients

Apples 2.5 lbs Butter 60 ml Sugar 75 ml Maple Syrup 150 ml

### Preparation

Melt butter on med-high in cast iron skillet, add sugar and cook while stirring until bubbly and just turning golden. Add maple syrup, cook while stirring until all sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat, starting at edge of pan arrange apples in concentric circles. Return to heat and simmer over med-low heat basting often until apples begin to soften and syrup starts to thicken. Remove from heat and let stand for 5 minutes.

Roll out Pâte Brisée (see recipe below) and place over apples, press edges down between apples and pan cut steam vents in dough Bake in middle rack of oven at 425°F for 30 minutes or until pastry is golden brown. Flip tarte onto plate so crust is on bottom and apples are on top and garnish with maple ice cream and candied pecans.

### PÂTE BRISÉE TART CRUST

Ingredients

Flour 1.5 cups
Salt 0.25 tsp
Sugar 0.25 tsp
Butter 90 ml
Shortening 30 ml
Water 60 ml

### Preparation

Sift flour, sugar and salt together. Add butter and shortening, cut or rub until it resembles coarse meal. Add water and mix with hands until dough comes together in moist clumps. Gather in ball and wrap in plastic, put in fridge for 1 hour to 3 days.

### Celebrating the Life and Legacy of Sir Sandford Fleming

On the 100th anniversary of his death in July, Sir Sandford Fleming's life and legacy were celebrated with a ceremony and the unveiling of a portrait of historic significance.

Fleming's great-great-grandson, Jock Fleming, Councillor of the Royal Canadian Institute for the Advancement of Science (RCI), and Helle Tosine, President of the RCI, presented the portrait of Fleming to College President Dr. Tony Tilly. The portrait was painted in the early 1890s by J.W.L. Forster, the leading Canadian portrait artist of the late 1800s and early 1900s. The portrait is on long-term loan to Fleming College by the RCI—the oldest scientific society in Canada and one that Fleming and a small group of civil engineers, architects and surveyors founded in 1849.

Fleming's Cultural Heritage and Conservation Management students, under the direction of program co-ordinator and professor Gayle McIntyre (Art Conservation Techniques '82), contributed to its preservation.

- Work hard as individuals by "doing" work yourself and not expecting others to do it for you.


- Be an effective team member by being an agent of excellence, recognizing and encouraging diversity, and inviting people to work hard with you.

### KTTC Donor Wall




