





June 4 - Michael Davis-Burchat The subject of the object and its context

What happens when you take up the forensic gaze for the benefit of learning – or re-learning – the composition of form? Michael will examine the small joys that come from this approach and how the artist can uncover meaning with some playful cropping and novice-level editing tools. Michael proposes there is an endless



space for meaning through framing and reframing the visual structure in ordinary images. In his talk Michael will challenge the notion that meaning is solely the domain of the sensational, and instead, reveals a source of cultural metaphor that emerges from within the mundane. Art made from this approach can create an end. It can also produce a wellspring of source material for other media and mannerisms.

June 11 - Sébastien Duchange

Itinerary of a Glassblower

Originally from the glass city of Saint-Gobain in France, Sébastien Duchange was on the path for an academic career in geography when suddenly that trajectory changed. Instead, he began to train at Cervav, a French training centre totally dedicated to



glass art and techniques. From there he apprenticed as a glass blower in Marseille, making glass objects for designers, architects and visual artists. Sébastien continued working in other glass studios across Europe before settling in Canada in the mid-2000s. This talk will focus on Sébastien's last 25 years as a glassblowing artist.

June 18 - Thomas Haskel Ceramics in the Caribbean

In this talk, Thomas will delve into the history of ceramics in the Caribbean from the pre-colonial period into the post-colonial period. The history of ceramics in the Caribbean is complex and rich. This includes the invasion and devastation of colonization and the new creation of creolized works. Thomas will discuss contemporary Caribbean ceramics in the present era and their place in a global setting.



June 25 - Garrett Gilbart Unnatural Resources

In their artist talk. Garrett will delve into the conceptual underpinnings of using historical found objects and sentimental materials for the basis of their steel sculptural works. This will include sourcing historical textile patterns and inspiration from the arts and crafts movement, anecdotes about sourcing salvaged materials, and the contemporary craft show circuit. This talk will encompass themes of



skilled craftsmanship, the alchemy of metallurgy, and the labour movement into dialogue with contemporary concerns such as automation, authenticity, climate change and the impacts of de-industrialization on workers, towns, and craft. Garrett invites audiences to reconsider the value of discarded materials and modes of production through the stories embedded in everyday objects and our relation to labour, exploring ideas and reflections on the intersections of art and craft, industrial history, land, and community.

July 2 - Jordan Clements Gothic Foliage in Stone: Artistry, Symbolism, and Evolution

This talk explores the intricate world of gothic foliage in stone carving, tracing its evolution, significance, and stylistic diversity across the medieval period. Gothic architecture is renowned for its ornate detail, and the carved foliage that adorns capitals, friezes, and corbels serves as a testament to the skill of medieval craftsmen and their connection to nature. Whether you are a lover of medieval art or a curious beginner,



this exploration of gothic foliage will offer new insights into a captivating facet of architectural history.

July 9 – Jan Anderson

The Power of Creating Art

Art is what an artist does. Artists expose their souls and hearts to their viewers. They take chances and put themselves out there by being vulnerable and overcoming the fear of rejection. Art transcends all language barriers and cultures. It can entertain and educate and



allows us to connect with people and circumstances we may or may not be comfortable with. Creating art is a calling, a need, a way of life that allows us to grow and fulfill our purpose. Art gives us purpose. Art allows Jan to tell stories that she feels in her heart need to be heard. Jan will be discussing pieces of her work that have left an impression on past audiences.

July 16 - Fernando Diaz de Leon Rendon

The Principles of Repoussé: Metal Embossing

Fernando's passion for art began while growing up in Mexico where his mother introduced him to repoussé and a variety of other art mediums. Captivated by the ancient allure of metal embossing, Fernando will discuss the timeless technique of creating stunning reliefs in metals. In this talk he will explore the history, principles, and various applications of repoussé. He will explain various practices, including



how to integrate recycled and natural materials into the medium. Fernando will share how sustainable art practices are an important part of reducing waste and teaching environmental awareness with creativity.

July 23 - Elizabeth Greisman Becoming an International Visual Artist in my Mid-Forties

Not much has changed for women artists in the last twenty years. Their time spent in the studio, running their art business and formative creative time, is often seen as running cross-purpose to the more conventional roles for women. A visual artist creates art in a disciplined, regular manner to fulfil a need inside oneself. It is a path whose value is not often understood nor sanctioned by our society. It may be necessary to have a second or third career, or a patron, to sustain



being an artist. Elizabeth will share her personal story.

Suzie is a 3X Juno Nominee and has won 12 Maple Blues Awards, 2 Canadian Folk Music Awards and a 2024 ECMA with her project A'Court, Spiegel and Vinnick. She has also twice won the International Songwriting Competition

- Blues Category. Her latest album is entitled Fall Back Home.

June 26 Jane Lewis

Jane Lewis has been leading vocal groups since 2008, from "Finding Your Voice" and "How to Sing Harmony by Ear" workshops to various choirs, Circle Singing, and community singing events. She has been studying improvisational singing with Rhiannon, and during the pandemic, attending Musica do Circulo music improv training workshops online. As a



singer-songwriter, she is often compared to Carole King, playing piano-based music that draws on her strength as a lyricist and singer. She performs most often with the folk duo Gathering Sparks (with Eve Goldberg), nominated for a 2014 Canadian Folk Music Award for Vocal Group of the Year. Jane has released two solo recordings, and Gathering Sparks released their newest album on Borealis Records in September 2019.
